Mothers, Tell Your Children....



Actually, the title of this article is misleading. This article is not just for mothers to read, but is important for fathers, grandmothers, grandfathers, aunts, uncles, and anyone who has influence over the children in their lives.

School is starting up again soon. How many of you have children who are in middle or high school? Have you talked to your children/grandchildren about their plans for the rest of their lives? Even middle school is not too soon for a child to start to think about it. I started with my children when they were still in grade school.

Children have many career options today and many, many educational options. Today, your child may want to be a teacher, or a nurse. Tomorrow they will change their minds and want to do something else. What is of utmost importance is that your children *think*

about it. Explore all the possibilities. And you, as mentor and role model, should be encouraging them to think about their future.

Of course, every little boy wants to be a professional football player, or a baseball player. Unless your child is a star athlete with college coaches knocking on your door, you need to gently deflect such lofty ideas. Rather than telling your child that they are not good enough to be a professional athlete, tell your child that he/she needs to have a ‘fallback’ career lined up, in case of injury, or in case he doesn’t make a team. It’s a reality check for them.

Think your child isn’t college material? Perhaps she isn’t the brightest star in the sky. Or maybe he just doesn’t like school – and every day is a struggle. He’s good with his hands, but doesn’t like to read. There are alternatives to college.

Anne Arundel County Public School System has excellent career programs at its Centers of Applied Technology. Programs include car repair, collision repair, computer networking, culinary arts, electrical, plumbing, nursing, and many more. Many of these programs offer certifications. And most importantly, your child can get a *life skill* that will enable them to be self-sufficient as adults. If you don’t know where to get information about the programs, contact the Career Connections Facilitator at your child’s high school. They can be of great assistance to your child in determining his or her own future.



You *can* make a difference in whether your child succeeds – but you need to steer them in the right direction – with guidance for a career and the future. Now is the time to start.

The Housing Commission encourages residents to enjoy all the amenities their community offers. We understand the desire to sit outdoors and enjoy the nice weather and each other's company. We realize that most of our apartments lack patios or balconies, which is why benches and picnic tables are placed throughout some properties.

In communities where benches aren't available, some residents like to relax and socialize by sitting on the apartment stairs or

in chairs in front of the building. This isn't a problem until access to and from the building is impeded or neighbors start complaining about noise. Then it becomes a police matter and the responding officer(s) are likely to use the County's loitering statutes to address the problem. Anne Arundel County Ordinance, Sec. 9-1-703, says that it's unlawful for a person to *"...remain on a public street, sidewalk, or pathway, including one privately owned but used by the public in general, so as to obstruct the free passage of a pedestrian or vehicle after a regular or special police officer has notified the person that the action is unlawful and has requested the person to move on."* Further, if you come back to the same public or private

property within 24 hours of being asked to leave and are there "for no apparent lawful reason" you're loitering and subject to be arrested.

We all want a quiet, peaceful living environment where we can sit outside enjoy the weather relax with neighbors and friends. But remember that these are apartment communities and apartment living sometimes means doing without some of the things associated with single-family homes; like private yards and space between neighbors. That doesn't mean you can't sit out and take advantage of a nice summer night every now and then. Just use common sense and respect your neighbor's right to peaceful enjoyment and you shouldn't have a problem.

CONNECT WITH YOUR TEEN

As your child approaches the teen years and becomes more independent, staying connected may seem like more of a challenge. But it's as important as ever - maybe even more so now.

While activities at school, new interests, and a burgeoning social life become more important to your growing child, you are still home base, providing love, guidance, and support. And that connection to you will

provide a sense of security and build the resilience your child needs to roll with life's ups and downs.

Your preteen may act as if your guidance isn't welcome or needed, and even seem embarrassed by you at times. This is when kids start to confide more in peers and request their space and privacy - expect the bedroom door to be shut more often.

As difficult as it may be to swallow all these changes, try not to take them personally. They're all signs of your child's growing independence. You're going to have to loosen the ties and allow some growing room. But you don't have to let go entirely. You're still a pow-

erful influence - it's just that your preteen may be more responsive to the example you set rather than the instructions you give. So practice what you'd like to preach, just preach it a little less for now.

Modeling the qualities that you want your preteen to learn and practice - respectful communication, kindness, healthy eating, and fulfilling everyday responsibilities without complaining - makes it more likely that your son or daughter will comply.

Small, simple things can reinforce connection. Make room in your schedule for special times, take advantage of the routines you already share, and show that you care.

ARE YOU REPORTING YOUR INCOME

Please remember that ALL income must be reported to Management. Your Lease states that all income must be reported within ten (10) days. Whether your income has increased or decreased you MUST report it within those ten

(10) DAYS. If you question what income might be, please contact your Manager so they can assist you.

What could happen if you don't report your income? Ultimately, you can be charged back rent on the amount of time you have been receiving that income.

BACK TO SCHOOL



Summer is almost over! Now back to the books. The definition of education is the knowledge or skill obtained or developed by a learning process.

Supporting your child's growth as a reader and writer begins at birth and continues throughout the school years. Here are some things you can do at each stage.

TODDLERS

Talking, sing and enjoy simple books together. Name the people and objects around you and in books. Talk about the things the two of you are doing. Learning words and conversations skills are first steps to literacy.

PRESCHOOLERS

Enjoy picture books at the library. Encourage your child to draw and "write" in whatever way he or she chooses. Write down stories your child tells you, then read them back to your child.

OLDER CHILDREN

When your child begins to read, be a good listener! Keep reading aloud to your child, too. When you write letters invite your child to add a drawing or a note. Parents be active in your child's learning process.

Have you completely and thoroughly read your residential lease agreement? Although, property managers thoroughly explain and answer all questions residents may have regarding the lease agreement during the move-in appointment, all residents should review their leases periodically.

Reviewing your lease periodically enables you to be an informed and educated consumer about the regulations, violations, and obligations of the Commission as well as yourself, which are stated in the lease agreement. Your lease agreement can also answer questions like, "How many days can I have overnight guests?" or "Can I have a pet?" It is also recommended that you speak with your property manager about any con-

cerns or questions you may be confused or unclear about regarding your lease agreement. Resident Council Meetings are also great opportunities for residents and property managers to discuss the lease agreement. Knowing and adhering to your lease agreement prevents violations and termination, which results in the peaceful enjoyment of your home and community.

HOW TO BE A GOOD TENANT

Be a dream tenant and your landlord will have no reason to complain. Here's how to win the heart of the person who owns (or manages) the roof over your head.

INSTRUCTIONS

STEP 1: Know and comply with

the conditions of your lease or rental agreement.

STEP 2: Refrain from damaging the premises or allowing guests to cause damage.

STEP 3: Keep your rental unit clean, and properly dispose of garbage.

STEP 4: Submit requests to your landlord in writing to avoid disputes and misunderstandings; keep copies of all correspondence.

STEP 5: Notify your landlord of needed repairs to keep components in good working order.

STEP 6: Allow your landlord to enter your rental unit for safety or maintenance reasons, with proper advance notice.

STEP 7: Keep noise levels to a minimum.

STEP 8: Purchase renter's insurance to cover your personal property in the event of loss.

STEP 9: Give proper advance notice to your landlord about your intentions to vacate the property, according to the terms of your lease or rental agreement.

IMPORTANT DATES

August 9, 2007 — Resident Council Meeting

I have not been at Burwood very long but I have heard from many of you with concerns or complaints and after reviewing our records, I see these very items have been addressed many times in the past. Let me share them with you and let's ask why we are still addressing these same issues:

- Slamming of doors — Please don't let your door slam when entering your unit, this is just being neighborly and respecting the other tenants in your building.
- Gossip — aren't we all adults here? If you are the one gossiping, no one wants to hear it and it will only lead to bad things. To the rest of

you, ignore it. If it falls on deaf ears and goes no further, it's not gossip.

- Assigned parking — as you all know, we do not have assigned parking here at Burwood. We do ask that if you are having guests, ask them NOT to park in front of the buildings, ask them to park across the parking lot and leave the spots in front of the building for the tenants. This is common courtesy.
- Please no backing into the parking spaces that are in front of the buildings, pull in parking only. When you have backed into a space, the next time you start your vehicle, the fumes and exhaust from your vehicle go into the building and windows.
- Please STOP propping open the laundry room door, doing that breaks the sensor and the automatic open and close breaks on the door and we have to have it repaired.

- Laundry Room hours are 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. That means you must leave by 7:00 p.m., not start your last load at 7:00 p.m. And there are to be no shopping carts in the Laundry Room!
- Shopping Carts — the ongoing saga with the shopping carts! When you are *done* with them, please leave them by the closest dumpster, not in the street, in parking spaces, in the hallways or on sidewalks.
- If you have children coming to visit you, please be mindful of your neighbors, kids can be quite loud and active, they must keep it down and be respectful when visiting Burwood.



Burwood is a great place to live! You have a wonderful neighborhood, very active Resident Council and plenty of great neighbors. Let's work together and get rid of the above list! !

WORK ORDERS – HELP US GET THE JOB DONE

Your requests are important to us! When calling in your maintenance request please state your unit number, property address and then the problem you are reporting. Please explain the problem as clearly as possible. The more information you provide, the better prepared we are to correct your problem. The clerk will enter the data into the computer to generate a work order. The work order will then be forwarded to the Property Manager who in turn will pass it onto the site technician. The technician works on all the calls as they come in, in priority order, and when he gets to your work order, he will be out to your unit to do the work.

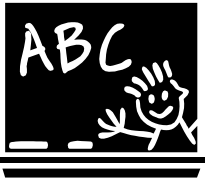

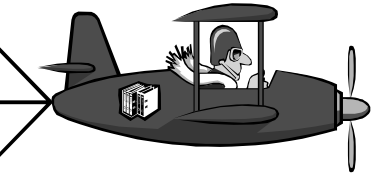
